#### September – Harvest Moon Festival

#### FSA (Foundational Skills Assessment)

Please note that this year's Foundation Skills Assessment for grade 4 and 7 be administered between October 2<sup>nd</sup> and November 10<sup>th</sup>. The annual Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA) is a required province-wide assessment of BC student's academic skills. The assessment provides a snapshot of how well our students are learning the foundational skills of Reading Comprehension, Writing and Numeracy. The FSA is designed by BC teachers and is linked to the redesigned provincial curriculum.

The main purpose of the assessment is to help the province, school districts, and schools evaluate how well students are achieving basic skills and make plans to support and improve student achievement. Our district uses the data to inform our Strategic plan.

The School District and our school uses the FSA results as one measure of achievement. Other measures include classroom assessments (student and teacher), teacher observations, district literacy assessments, and report cards. We use the information from all these assessments together to establish district and school goals.

All students are required to write the FSA, unless the school principal has excused a student, based on Ministry criteria.
